Role of CCUSA Parish Social Ministry Section

She coordinates their policy and advocacy work, and focuses on transforming the national conversation around poverty.






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115th Congress: CCUSA Early

 - President submits FY 18 budget
- March 15th
 - Debt ceiling suspension expires
- <u>April 28th</u>
 - FY 17 Continuing Resolution expires
- September 30th
 - FY 18 Appropriations Deadline
 - Children's Health Insurance Program authority expires
 - National Flood Insurance Program expires
 - Child and Family Services Improvement and Innovation Act expires

First 100 Days

CCUSA Early Engagement

- Budget and Appropriations
 - FY 17 Appropriations
 - FY 18 Appropriations
- Health Care Repeal/Replace
 - Process: Will use reconciliation process for most of repeal
 - Substance: Budget resolution for the repeal introduced on first day
- Immigration and Refugee
 - Regulatory:
 - Immigration and Boarder Security Executive Orders
 - Refugee Executive Orders
 - Legislative BRIDGE Act

Budget Reconciliation

What is it?

Allows the Senate to get around the need for a 60-vote majority to invoke cloture.

How will it be likely used?

- To repeal most of the Affordable Care Act
- Pass tax cuts and make entitlement/mandatory spending reforms

Limitations


- Generally will impact the reduction of deficit
- Generally only used to change entitlement programs
 - Medicare, Medicaid, unemployment benefits, SNAP, federal employee retirement, block grants, federal loans and subsidies, user fees, and tax rates, credits and deductions
- Can't be used on discretionary spending (other than budget caps)
- Can't be used for changes in Social Security's old age, survivors and disability insurance benefits programs. But can be used for other portions of Social Security



Issue:

- Pass FY 17 appropriations bill before April 28th
- FY 18 appropriations by September 30th
- Murray/Ryan budget agreement ends and sequester returns for FY 18








Overall Federal Budget

- > FY 17 Budget: \$1.069
 - \$551 billion (Defense)
 - \$518 billion (Non-defense)
- > FY 18 Budget: \$1.064
 - \$549 billion (Defense)
 - \$515 billion (Non-defense)


Trump Plan Would Cut Non-Defense Discretionary Funding Deeply Over Time

What to Expect

- Budget will be late
- FY 17 budget agreement will be used to repeal ACA
- FY 18 budget agreement to pass tax reform and/or cut entitlements
- First major test will come in April
- Rep Mulvaney's Confirmation for Budget Director set for Thursday

CCUSA Engagement

- Continued Advocacy on FY 17 Appropriations
- Address Sequester and entitlement reforms
 - Joint CCUSA January 18th Circle of Protection letter: "Adopt a budget framework that replaces sequestration, protects low-income entitlement programs such as SNAP and Medicaid, and maintains a circle of protection around funding for programs focused on people in poverty."

Health Care Reform

Where Things Stand:

- Budget reconciliation passed in January and reconciliation process underway
- A lot of ideas emerging but no consensus on path for repeal and replace
- Some areas emerging
 - Tax credits
 - Health Savings Accounts

However: Division remains

- Some caution by Governors
- Division on how to proceed on Medicaid
 - How to treat Medicaid expansion states
 - Block Grant– set amount determined by base year
 - Per capita allotment set amount per individual state's average medical assistance and nonbenefit expenditures per full year equivalent enrollee (2016),

• January 18 Letter:

• "Any repeal of the Affordable Care Act is done concurrently with a plan that protects the millions of Americans who have insurance, or gained access to health care under the Affordable Care Act, and provides access to health care for the millions still living without affordable health care."

Immigration and Refugee

The Issue:

President Trump has signed three Immigration and Refugee Executive Orders


- 1) Border Security and Immigration Enforcement Order
- 2) Interior Enforcement Order
- 3) Refugee and Travel Ban order

Where Things Stand today

- Wall funding
- Key portions of refugee and travel ban halted by 9th Circuit Court of Appeals
- Interior enforcement actions
- Questions remain about potential future executive orders on 'public charge" and DACA



Immigration and Refugee Services – Border Security and Immigration Enforcement




What it Does

- 1. Moves forward on Wall
- 2. Increasing Number of Border Patrol Agents
- 3. Increases Detention Facilities
- 4. Ends "Catch and Release" by requiring detention for all aliens pending removal proceedings
- 5. Expedites "credible fear" determines by assigning asylum officer to detention centers
- 6. Directs agencies to quantify federal aid to Mexico on annual basis for past 5 years



Immigration and Refugee Services – Interior Enforcement



What it Does

- 1. Attempts to defund sanctuary cities
- 2. Changes enforcement priorities to "any criminal offices"
- 3. Deputizes local law enforcement officers
- 4. Reinstates "Secure Communities" program
- 5. Begins process to impose civil fins for those who facilitate undocumented presence
- 6. Hires an addition 10,000 ICE officers



Immigration and Refugee Services – Refugee and Travel Ban




22,982

refugees were served through cultural orientation, housir interpreter services, job placement, and matched saving programs during their initial resettlement period.



21,770

refugees received ongoing resettlement assistance durin their post resettlement period.



What it Does


- 1. 90-day ban of people from Syria, Iraq, Iran, Somalia, Sudan, Libya, and Yemen;
- 2. 120-day suspension of the refugee resettlement program for ALL refugees
- 3. Indefinite suspension of the arrival of Syrian refugees;
- 4. 64% decrease for U.S. refugees in 2017-110,000 to 50,000;
- 5. Prioritizes refugee religious based claims for individuals who are religious minority
- 6. Mandated review and possibly stricter security vetting procedures
- 7. Begins process for enhancing State and local control over refugee placements;



Immigration and Refugee Services – DACA/DAPA/Public Charge

PUBLIC CHARGE

- Expands types of public assistance for which a person could be deported as a "public charge"
- Eliminates access to the CTC for mixed immigrant families
- Denies SSI benefits for undocumented workers who becomes citizens or legal residents
- Calls for reports on: foreign workers impact on SSI, long-term cost of refugee admission program and US birth-tourism





Immigration and Refugee

Catholic Charities USA Engagement:

- Stand in solidarity with Immigrant and Refugee families
- Active collaboration with partners at USCCB, CLINIC and other Catholic organizations
- Launch of \$8 million campaign to assist immigrant and refugee programs
- Action Alerts

"We need to stay focused on our care for those who are frightened and vulnerable. The executive orders are having an impact not only on very frightened people seeking to come to our country and the refugees already here, but also on those serving them and trying to get them integrated into our communities."

Other Issues

Conscience and Religious Liberty Protections

<u>Issue:</u> Draft religious liberty executive order and House "Better Way" proposal promises to permanently enact and expand Weldon Amendment and to enforce Hyde Amendment

Criminal Justice Reform

<u>Issue:</u> Parties in both chambers continue to support an overhaul of the criminal justice system, especially a reduction in mandatory minimum prison sentences for minor drug crimes. However, will be difficult lift after a "tough on crime" campaign and congressional division on proposals.

Child and Family Services Improvement and Innovation Act

<u>Issue:</u> Program expires September 30th, 2017. A bill (*Families First*) to reauthorize the program and change child protection and congregate care programs nearly passed last congress and has broad bipartisan support.

Farm Bill/SNAP/Child Nutrition Reauthorization

<u>Issue:</u> The 2014 farm bill expires on Sept. 30, 2018 and hearings are beginning now. Child Nutrition Reauthorization likely to remain stalled.
















OUR WORK

Case Study: Payday Lending Reform in Arlington, Texas



Background

- Efforts to regulate predatory lending at state level have failed
- 2013 Texas cities stepped up to regulate
- None in Tarrant County



Movement

- Grassroots efforts joined coalitions and established groups
- Summer 2015 Arlington City Council began discussing an ordinance
- State level groups came to support and connect resources
- Passed November 2015



What lead to success?

- Advocacy from the ground level to state
- Coalition building



What does that look like?

- Determine mission
- Identify goals
 - SMART (Specific Measurable Achievable Realistic Timed) goals
- Create strategy



Building and sustaining

- Not an overnight success
- Organizing the community



Identify key players and resources

- Partners in the community and field
- Multiple roles: who is the best fit for each
- Spokesperson from the community: Father Kelley
- The payday lending industry has millions of dollars in lobbying funds, we needed on the ground and tangible resources



Communicate effectively

- Hardest challenge
- An informed and cohesive message moves others



Educate and engage

- How are you getting your mission and goals across?
- Who is going to help you?
- Get in front and speak
